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### **Introduction of the Field Project**

As per NEP 2020, the students/ learners have opportunities for conducting field work project on the any contemporary social, cultural and developmental issues and problems of the society. The students/ learners will get opportunities to be oriented to the practical task or gather primary, field based data, facts, information and insights on the contemporary social issues and problems of the society. The students have choice to select any topic for field work in any community, organizations and any institutions. The learner has choice to select any topic as per his and her interest with discussion of his/her mentor/teachers. The field work should be related to the contemporary issues or domain areas of sociological applications of research tools, techniques and field work research methods. The learner has choice to use qualitative, quantitative and mixed method approach as per his or her interest for data collection from the field and as per his or her field/ study setting. The learner has to complete his or her field work under the supervisors and mentors. The field work comprises orientation visits, observation visits, documentation of case studies, preparation of village profiles, conducting Participatory Rural Appraisal (PRA), Impact Assessments of developmental projects on the caste, class, gender and tribes in the rural, tribal and urban communities. Rapid Rural Appraisal (RRA), use of primary tools of data collections, documentation of ethnographic profiles of ethnic social groups and minorities, small reports on contemporary any social issues and problems related to the contemporary societies. The field work project assignments should be based on the core domain of the major (Sociology) subject, theory, methodology and tools and techniques of sociological research. The research proposal/ design / field/ study setting of the each and every student of field project work should be separate and unique. The Student has choice to do field work in any community, Non-Governmental Organizations, Governmental Organizations, Semi-Governmental Organizations and in any institutions. It is expected that each and every student has to select his or her own separate topic

for the field project work report.

**Course pre-requisite:**

1. Student should have basic knowledge about the methods of field work.
2. Student should have prior interest to know the field work methods of data and information collection.
3. Students should have primary interest to field visit and gather and collect information and data from the ground/ field.

**Course objectives:**

- To provide students with practical exposure to identify the contemporary field issues and problems of society.
- To provide practical knowledge and exposure to understand the ground realities and learn field reality through field visit and work.
- To develop skills of field investigations, data collection, observation and documentations of information on the contemporary social, cultural and developmental issues of the society.
- To orient the student to link and apply theoretical knowledge in the field project report writing and presentation.

After completion of the field project, students will be able to:

## **Guideline of the Field Project**

- Students have choice to select any topic as per his or her interest or related to the Major subject (Sociology). Students can be selected any topics on the contemporary social, cultural, political, economical, developmental, environmental, issues and problems related to the rural, urban, tribal and industrial societies. The student can also do field work in any community, Non-Governmental Organizations, Governmental Organizations, Semi-Governmental Organizations and in any institutions.
- Students have choice to select topic as per his or her own interests such as, agrarian crisis, farmer suicides, issues of widow women farmers, caste, class, gender, tribes and inequalities. The rural, tribal and urban developmental projects and its impacts on the people. The Environment, climate change, sustainable development, development, displacements and its impacts on the people. The Role of NGOs and Governmental Organizations and its impacts on the people. This is only an indicative list of the topics and not an exhaustive one. Student has choice to select any topics as per his or her own interest for field work project.
- Students should discuss with supervisor and finalize the topic for field work project.
- A Teacher in the department of Sociology is eligible to guide the students.
- Department of Sociology or college/ institutions should provide orientation workshops for field work project for its procedures, report writing and documentations.
- Student should have to maintain field dairy for mention the days, times, dates of field visits, field notes, observation, daily field reports, points and memos during the field interactions in the field settings.
- Field Project Report should be done by each student separately under the guidance of the teacher.
- Topics should be based on the core domain of the major (Sociology) subject, theory, methodology and tools and techniques of sociological research used in the field work project.
- Structure of the field project report- at the time of report writing , the students should follow the structure of field project report such as:
  1. Title page
  2. Introduction
  3. Objectives of the Study
  4. Research Methodology
  5. Data analysis and interpretation
  6. Findings, conclusion and Recommendations
  7. Learning and Critical reflections of Sociological thoughts.
  8. References
- Every table, figures, photographs should have a caption with references.

- The total number of pages should be minimum 50 pages, including text, figures, tables, photographs, references and appendices.
- At the time of Viva-Voce presentation may given with the help of equipment (computer/ ICT Board /PPT) which are available in the respective departments.
- Project work will be assessed as per our SRTM, University Rules or given guidelines in the NEP, 2020.
- The guidelines and the structure of the Field Project report, assessment and evaluation patterns and methods will be as per NEP, 2020 and our university instructions will be given for the assessment.

6. To facilitate linkages between students and potential employers, organizations, and research institutions for future career and research opportunities.

## **OJT/ Internship Guidelines:**

OJT/Internships for graduate Sociology students are valuable educational experiences that bridge the gap between academic knowledge and real-world business and social practices. This document outlines guidelines to help Sociology students make the most of their internship opportunities.

### **The following is the purpose of On-Job Training/Internship/:**

1. **Educational Growth:** The primary goal of an internship is to enhance the educational experience by gaining practical exposure to the business and social world.
2. **Skill Development:** Acquire and hone skills relevant to the field of study, such as social, Government, Non-Government, finance, Health, or Development, Management.
3. **Career Development:** Internships will explore potential career paths, network with professionals, and bolster students' resumes.

OJT/Internships are educational and career development opportunities, providing practical experience in a field or discipline. Internships are far more important as employers are looking for employees who are properly skilled and have an awareness of the industry environment, practices and culture. The internship is structured, short-term, supervised training often focused on particular tasks or projects with defined time scales.

**Duration: The OJT/internship is of 120 hours. The students need to complete the selected OJT/internship for fulfilment of the mandatory 04 credits in the VI semester of the graduation.**

**Note:** Students can complete the OJT/internship/s during the VI semester condition to compulsorily attending the theory and practical sessions of the other courses prescribed in the semester or after the conclusion of the VI semester examination during the summer vacations (Summer Term). The last date of submission of the OJT/Internship report will be on or before the 30th day after the conclusion of the VI semester examination every year or the date declared by the college/department in the specific academic year.

## **Areas for OJT/ Internship:**

### **Sociology Discipline: Areas for OJT / Internship**

Sociology is a broad and interdisciplinary field, so internship opportunities exist across **social, economic, political, cultural, and developmental sectors.**

#### **Government & Public Administration:**

Sociology students can undertake internships in various government departments such as Social Welfare, Rural Development, Urban Local Bodies, Panchayati Raj Institutions (Gram Panchayat, Block, Zilla Parishad), District Collector and Tehsil offices. Opportunities also exist in public policy think tanks, census and statistical departments, labour and employment offices, and women and child development departments, where students can understand governance, policy implementation, and social administration.

#### **NGOs & Civil Society Organizations:**

Students may work with NGOs, community-based organizations (CBOs), self-help groups (SHGs), advocacy groups. These organizations focus on issues like human rights, gender justice, tribal development, disability support, and community empowerment, offering practical exposure to grassroots social change.

#### **Health & Public Health Sector:**

Internships can be pursued in hospitals (government and private), public health NGOs, mental health institutions, community health projects, and primary health centres (PHCs). Students may also work with nutrition programs like ICDS and Anganwadi, and organizations dealing with HIV/AIDS, TB, and maternal health, gaining insight into health inequalities and social determinants of health.

#### **Education & Academic Sector:**

Students can engage with schools, colleges, educational NGOs, adult education programs, and skill development missions. Opportunities also exist in research institutes, universities, and EdTech organizations, where students can contribute to teaching assistance, curriculum development, and educational research.

#### **Media, Communication & Cultural Sector:**

Sociology students can intern with newspapers, magazines, digital media platforms, social media agencies, documentary film organizations, publishing houses, and public relations firms. These experiences help in understanding media influence, communication strategies, and cultural representation in society.

#### **Corporate & Industrial Sector:**

Internship opportunities are available in corporate social responsibility (CSR) departments, human resource (HR) departments,

industrial relations units, MSMEs, and startups. Students can also work in labour welfare departments, market research firms, and organizational development consultancies, focusing on workplace dynamics and social aspects of business.

### **Rural Development & Agriculture Sector:**

Students can work with agricultural extension programs, farmer producer organizations (FPOs), cooperative societies, rural livelihood missions (NRLM), watershed development projects, and microfinance institutions. These internships provide exposure to rural economy, livelihoods, and agrarian social structures.

### **Urban Development & Planning:**

Internships in urban planning departments, housing and slum development authorities, NGOs working on urban poverty, smart city projects, and transport planning bodies allow students to study urbanization, migration, and infrastructure challenges.

### **Environment & Sustainability Sector:**

Students may work with environmental NGOs, climate change projects, forest departments, wildlife conservation organizations, and waste management initiatives. These internships focus on sustainability, environmental justice, and the social impact of ecological issues.

### **Law, Justice & Human Rights:**

Opportunities include legal aid centres, family courts, juvenile justice boards, NGOs working on legal awareness, prison reform organizations, and human rights commissions. Students gain understanding of law, justice systems, and rights-based approaches.

### **Research, Data & Analytics:**

Students can intern with social research organizations, survey agencies, policy research institutes, data analysis firms, think tanks, and monitoring and evaluation agencies. These roles help develop research skills, data collection, and policy analysis capabilities.
